Educational Opportunities

ADCOP Program

The Associate Degree Completion Program (ADCOP) offers an opportunity for highly motivated career petty officers to pursue a full time course of instruction in junior college which leads to an associate of science or arts degree in various vocational - technical fields.

ADCOP classes convene in September and February each year at the following junior colleges: Mount San Antonio College, Walnut California, Palomar College, San Marcos, California; and Pensacola Junior College, Pensacola, Florida.

In general, to be eligible to apply for ADCOP, you must be a U. S. Citizen, petty officer 2nd

class or above in the Regular Navy and have completed at least one regular enlistment. Must have completed at least 7 years of continuous active naval service as of 1 November of the fiscal year. You must be a high school graduate or three years of high school and a USAFI GED with a combination of Navy Class "A", "B" and "C" schools totaling at least 24 weeks of classroom training, or Navy Class "A" or "B" school and at least 6 transferable college credits. A clear record for the past 2 years (court martials), and no more than 2 C.O.NJP

Deadline for Special request chit is 1 March 1969.
